Party for Progress (PFP)

The infrastructure of a country is the backbone of its economy and one of the main areas of governance that people experience in their daily lives. Like many island states, Sint Maarten's infrastructure leaves much to be desired. PFP maintains that a "bigger picture" approach must be taken to building and maintaining infrastructure.

Let's take our roads for example, many are in a dire state and have had their life span cut short due to lack of drainage or to wastewater being delivered to our roads. We have also not been using the proper thickness required to handle bigger, heavier vehicles driving on them. Whatever the cause, the fact remains that we need a sustainable solution to not just build, but also to maintain our road network. The government has allocated money from capital expenditure funds to pay for programs such as Road and Hard Surfacing, but the question is always: What happens after?

PFP has always pushed for the establishment of the Road Fund. The money collected from road tax is chan-

nelled into that fund instead of going into the general "pocketbook" of Government. The Road Fund would be responsible for maintaining existing roads and identifying possible construction options for new roads. The age-old saying that prevention is better than cure can be used here – with a properly established and funded Road Fund, there will be planned maintenance programs to make sure the road is safe for you and your vehicle. The Ministry of VROMI is seeing how we can address these issues within the scope of the current programs.

Solid Waste and Wastewater Management also need serious attention on our island. Current practices are not sustainable, from poor solid waste collection, to a dump nearing the end of its life, and wastewater projects that are severely behind schedule, to the severe lack of funding to run these services. Combating these issues won't be cheap, and they also require a change in our behaviour towards waste, especially because we live in a country where these services are free for citizens. The repercussions for certain actions, such as littering or allowing your wastewater to end up

in the streets, are non-existent. In the cities of developed nations, budget allocation for these services can be anywhere from 15% to 35% of the city's annual budget — even then, the task can be a monumental and expensive one.

To combat this, PFP has always advocated for a Waste Authority, a body whose sole purpose is to manage solid waste, from collection to final processing, and enforcement of fines when people don't follow regulations. Funds collected for these services would again be put exactly where needed. The Ministry of VROMI is currently in the process of investigating the rollout of such a body. This is just a small glimpse at what needs to be done to sustainably develop Sint Maarten's infrastructure, but it's a good start. Realizing these goals will take tough choices by decision-makers and a big change in our habits as a people of this country. PFP has been and remains willing to make the tough decisions to move the needle towards a sustainable future forward.

Environment





What are the tasks of Parliament?

From Parliament of St. Maarten

The two main tasks of Parliament that has been submitted to Parliament are as follows:

- To act as co-legislator (article 82 of the Constitution)
- To exercise control over Government's policies

In order to fulfil these tasks, Members of Parliament have the following powers at their disposal:

 The right to ask questions (article 62 of the Constitution)

Members of Parliament have the right to ask questions to Ministers concerning their policies.

• The right of interpolation (article 63 of the Constitution)

Besides the right to ask questions, Members of Parliament also have the right to call a Minister to Parliament to give account about his/her policies.

• The right of inquiry (article 64 of the Constitution)

Members of Parliament have the right

to request Parliament to investigate a specific topic. If Parliament decides to investigate a specific topic, a Committee is set up that will handle in accordance with the National ordinance inquiry.

- The right of initiative (article 85 of the Constitution)
 Members of Parliament have the right to initiate a new national ordinance or amend an existing national ordinance.
- The right of amendment (article 86 of the Constitution)

Members of Parliament have the right to propose amendments to a national ordinance that has been submitted to Parliament by Government or one or more Members of Parliament before it is approved or rejected.

 The right to approve and amend the budget (article 100 of the Constitution)

Members of Parliament have the right to have insight into the country's finances and decide about the allocation and spending of its funds.

In order to fulfil the tasks as aforementioned, the work of Members of Parliament consists predominantly of attending Parliament meetings, questioning Ministers during these meetings and voting on legislation, amendments, motions and other important matters. Making such important decisions requires preparation such as reading the entire file, work visits and speaking with the public. If Parliament deems it necessary, it can hold hearings with third parties to receive the information it needs.

Oualichi Movement for Change (OMC)

The new ministry's daily operations will be dynamic in its scope, involving policy formulations, project management, and stakeholder collaborations to ensure strategic objectives are effectively met.

As Sint Maarten continues to evolve, both in terms of its societal needs and technological advancements, OMC government will lay down a significant plan to address these changing dynamics with a USD \$3 billion total remodel of the entire island infrastructure. The two

critical focus areas of OMC are the implementation of a comprehensive National Road Safety Strategy, and the development of state-of-the-art sub-sea fiber cables to bolster the nation's digital infrastructure.

Prime Minister Olivier Arrindell will implement the National Road Safety Strategy, emphasizing its genesis against a backdrop of concerning accident rates and deplorable road network and traffic congestion. The OMC National Road Safety Strategy will come to the forefront of the OMC government. Looking back at

the many issues with the road network, OMC has explained its position throughout its philosophy.

The affordable housing crisis is unique to Sint Maarten. The OMC government will confront this issue head-on, adopting innovative and sustainable approaches to provide homes and ensure they are within the financial reach of its citizens and provide direct financing at a 95% loan to value, backed by government. Prime Minister Olivier Arrindell will make sure to sell every home at the present moment to the people at an equitable value rate.

"Housing is a big thing here for the OMC government," Olivier Arrindell asserts, emphasizing the commitment to delivering "the best affordable housing we can deliver for our people." This dedication ensures that the homes are affordable and built to the highest sustainability and durability standards, with features like state-of-the-art systems, spray foam insulation, and energy-efficient windows. "It's a Cat. five infrastructure that the OMC Government will build, and that will be sold to the people at 2% to 3% for a 25-to-30-year FHBM program. This will be backed by the new banking system of BANK OF SOUALIGA (B.O.S.).
